Founded by sisters Lizzie Means Duplantis and Sarah Means, Miron Crosby was born in 2017 as a fashion-forward cowboy boot brand with roots in Texas traditions and authenticity. They have been featured in *Vogue* and on the Today Show, and their hand-crafted designs are a favorite with celebrities and locals alike.


The brand takes its name from the founders' great-grandfather, Marion Otis Means, whom they consider the "ultimate gentleman." Miron is a play on his first name, while Crosby is a throwback to the name of a pasture on their family's ranch, as well as one of their favorite streets in SoHo in New York City, where they each lived before returning home to Texas.

What do you love about Dallas?

LIZZIE: I've been in Dallas since 2014, and Sarah has been here since 2016. It's where we've based our brand and planted our roots. We grew up on a cattle ranch in West Texas, then went to university in Fort Worth and moved to New York, where we each lived for a decade. We chose to come back to Dallas because it's such a fantastic city for fashion.

SARAH: It's become the capital of fashion in the South. People here are so welcoming and supportive, and it's been a great place to grow a business. We also love that it's a little bit eccentric. It's very colorful, both visually and when it comes to people's personalities. People go big in every sense—restaurants are bold experiences from the aesthetics to the flavors and when it comes to fashion, people are just as concerned about their headbands as they are about their ballgowns.

What made you want to design cowboy boots?

LIZZIE: Our cousins own a boot factory, so we'd design our own and then they would produce them. When Sarah and I were in New York, we were always still wearing our cowboy boots from home. I was working at Goldman Sachs wearing them, and Sarah was working in fashion and wearing them. They didn't just work in Texas, but in a range of situations in New York too.

SARAH: We noticed a void in the market. There weren't any fashion-forward Western boots out there. Everything was very male-centric—or people thought that if you just made them pink and put rhinestones on them, women would wear them, but that's not really our look. Ours are authentic, stylish and original.

What makes your boots unique?

LIZZIE: Our factory has been in existence since the 1860s and in our family since the 1960s. Each boot is handcrafted by artisans that have worked there for decades. They truly understand the craftsmanship behind the materials. For example, the pegs in the bottom of the boots are all lemonwood, which is porous and absorbs water and swells and dries when it needs to. It assures that the boot doesn't get damaged and fits like it should.

SARAH: I worked in fashion, and so much of our inspiration comes from street style in New York City. We think about what we, ourselves, would want to wear. Lots of our inspiration comes from the runway, but also flora and fauna too. Western wear has also always inspired brands like Valentino, Saint Laurent, Isabel Marant and Zimmerman, so there's something full circle about it.

How does the city influence you?

SARAH: We are always looking at what women are wearing and how they dress to go to work or out at night. Then, of course we have our Mansion Boot, which is inspired by Rosewood Mansion on Turtle Creek and features the hotel's signature quatrefoil motif.

LIZZIE: We're also so inspired by how the city has evolved in the last handful of years. It's not at all homogenous, and there are numerous distinct pockets in the city where you can have a great cocktail, see a great show, and then go have a great meal. Each of these little communities has its own unique personality that stands out.



Scoot up to Knox Henderson for delightful shopping at Grange Hall, which is a combination of the most amazing curio shop for jewelry, vintage finds, apothecary, flowers and more, as well as restaurant. The snob sandwich (Petrossian smoked salmon, egg salad, crème fraiche, and Petrossian caviar on a brioche) is a must. Pair it with a glass of chilled Sancerre.

Brunch at Le Bilboquet is not to be missed. The charming dining room feels right out of Europe, serving the most decadent French Toast and grass-fed Texas beef.

Head back to The Mansion, rest and refresh, then off to Monkey Bar on the third floor of Mi Cocina in Highland Park Village for a Mambo Taxi sundowner, made of tequila, lime juice, sangria, brandy, and fruit juices. For dinner, you can't miss the local institution that is Javier's. The filete cantinflas cannot be beat! After dinner, grab espresso martinis at The Mansion Bar.

DALLAS ARTS DISTRICT

Start your Sunday with a cruise through the Dallas Museum of Art (don't miss photography by Bank Langmore and John Henry's aluminum sculpture), Nasher Sculpture Center and check out the nearby Klyde Warren Park, which is a 5-acre park built over a recessed eight-lane freeway. Be sure to grab a quick snack at Food Truck Lane.

GREENVILLE AVENUE

For Sunday supper, tuck into RapsCALLION on Greenville Avenue. After you munch on fried green tomatoes, stroll down Greenville and grab an alfresco after-dinner drink at the HG Supply rooftop patio or a popsicle from Steel City Pops.



3. In the summer, I love a Strawberry Banana Smoothie or The Texas Margarita by the pool while reading a stack of fashion magazines. Instant vacation.


SARAH MEANS
